LEARN TO FLY SATURDAY



CUCKOO'S NEST

Hello members of EAA 99! Our featured member this month is Lars, who has been flying since 1947. Yes, that's 62 years!! This 80 something year old pilot took me up in his 74 year old airplane (1934 Tiger Moth) and told me stories

74 year old airplane (1934 Tiger Moth) and told me stories of his life as an aviator.

Lars grew up on a small island in the Baltic, between Switzerland and Russia. The chief of the Swedish air force was on the board of the company that Lars's father was in charge of. This general "I can't pronounce his name" came once a year to Lars' parents home for the board meeting. Lars remembers that he was very inspiring and encouraged the children to take an interest in flying.

During the war Lars saw many airplanes and also built model airplanes. The Swedish military had compulsory




service and of course Lars wanted to join the air force, but his father felt that it would be too dangerous and wanted him to go to college before he could become an officer and pilot. So his father promised to pay for private flying lessons at some opportune time later.

Lars entered the university and discovered that they had a flying club with 5 Klemms they had just purchased from the Swedish military. He wrote home to his father and asked if he could start flying. His father kept his promise and paid for Lars to learn to fly, beginning in the fall of 1947. Lars continued to learn through the winter, mostly flying with skis and received his license in the spring. Right after he received his license the club started to offer a 5-hour aerobatic course, so Lars took that also. He said that since that time he has tried to stay current, and continues to do some aerobatic flying even in his 80's!

After university, Lars spent some time as a mining engineer in the mountains were there where no airports, so he was only able to fly in the summers during his vacation. Sometime later Lars moved to America for a while and then to India and did some flying in Piper Cubs. After the Chinese attacked, the Indian government would not allow foreigners to fly. With the money he made in India he bought a Klemm, but discovered how difficult the Klemm is to work on. In 1972 he found a Tiger Moth – that's the one he is still flying today.

For about 12 years Lars had a business in San Jose and Riverside California doing cremation – with a Cessna 182!! He would spread the ashes at sea, in the desert and over the mountains. Surely Lars was a pioneer in this line of work.



These are just some highlights. Lars loves to talk about his experiences. If you like to hear good flying stories – just ask him for more!

"A significant step toward establishing an alternative unleaded fuel took place this week, as Teledyne Continental Motors, Inc. (TCM) announced the first test flight using unleaded aviation fuel (94UL) in a certificated aircraft. Essentially 100LL without the lead, 94UL may provide a long-term fuel from established sources, while imposing the least impact on the flying community, TCM said during a teleconference this week. EAA has conducted considerable research into alternative aviation fuels to ensure members can pursue their passion for flight." Read the full story online:
